

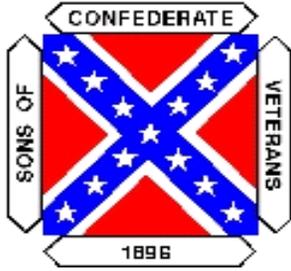

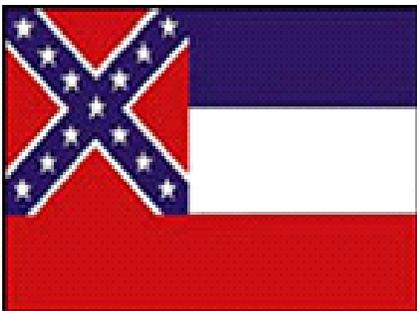
April Meeting **Nathan Bedford Forrest**

Rebel Ramblings

I came across an interesting book the other day, and hope to start on it soon. Its' A Disease In the Public Mind by Thomas Fleming, and it is about what caused the UnCivil War. A review that I read, which got my interest raised, said that Mr. Fleming's conclusion is that the war was a product of the two sections simply loathing each other, that they had for some time. The review added that Mr. Fleming puts much of the blame on the shoulders of incendiary abolitionists like William Lloyd Garrison.

You will recall it was Garrison who exploded in anger when Lincoln had the temerity in 1863 to suggest a system of compensated emancipation as a way to settle the issue. Garrison called Lincoln "demented" for making the proposal, which Garrison said "borders upon hopeless lunacy." Reminds me of a passage in a book about Vietnam I read one time. A chopper was evacuating wounded under heavy fire when the men lifting a wounded officer into the chopper dropped him. An enlisted man lying on a stretcher awaiting loading remarked "not exactly the helping hand the lieutenant was looking for."

Isn't it amazing the role that fortune plays in the affairs of men? Take how the Confederacy got possession of the vessel that became the Alabama. This ship was built in Liverpool and was known as Vessel No. 290. It was an open secret the ship was being built by Laird Brothers for the Confederacy and the Union ambassador Charles Francis Adams sent a strongly worded protest to the appropriate official, the Queen's Advocate. It just so happened on the day the message arrived that official happened to go insane and was forcibly taken to the hospital. Communications lay untouched on his desk for some five days and in that five day period Vessel No. 290 put to sea and fulfilled her destiny.

In reading my last column, on Beauvoir, I see I may have given my readers the idea I think the Confederate flag is an issue at Beauvoir. It isn't; the issue is Chairman Forte's leadership style, his inflexibility, his





competence. and his failure to put Beauvoir on a financially sound basis. The Confederate flag is just a smoke screen Mr. Forte always uses to divert attention from the real issue--him. Whenever anyone disagrees with the destructive direction Mr. Forte has given Beauvoir that person is accused of being "anti-Confederate" or "against the flag." It is a simplistic argument that appeals to those that don't know the facts or the real issues.

All of the present Board need to go--a clean sweep. I am reminded of how Cromwell dismissed the Rump Parliament in 1653: "You have sat too long for any good you have been doing. Depart, I say, and let us have done with you." Bring back men like Don Barrett and Ed Funchess to form a new board; ask men like Ron Stowers and John French to return. Try to get Bertram Hayes-Davis to come back as the Director, a man who can develop community support and a sound financial basis. Better act now before it is too late.

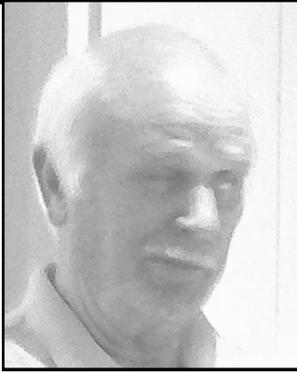

Trivia Question:
