
O January Meeting O Black Confederate Pensioners: Black Contributions to the Civil War Effort.



Chaplain's Dispatch

Dear Friends and Compatriots,

When G. W. Custis Lee, was in school his father, Robert E. Lee, wrote him the following letter to impress upon him some guiding principles of character, duty and virtue. His words are relevant to us today.

"You must study to be frank with the world; frankness is the child of honesty and courage. Say just what you mean to do on every occasion, and take it for GRANTED YOU MEAN TO DO RIGHT. If a friend asks a favor, you should Grant IT, IF IT IS REASONABLE: IF NOT, TELL HIM PLAINLY WHY YOU CANNOT: YOU WILL WRONG HIM AND WRONG YOURSELF BY EQUIVOCATION OF ANY KIND. Never do a wrong thing to make a friend or keep one; the man who requires you to do so, is dearly purchased at a sacrifice. Deal kindly but firmly, with all your classmates; you will find it the policy which wears best. Above all, do not appear to others what you are not. If you have any fault to find with anyone, tell him, not others, of what you complain; there is no more dangerous experiment than that of undertaking to be one thing before a man's face and another behind his back. We should live, act, and say nothing to the injury of anyone. It is not only best as a matter of principle, but it is the path to peace and honor.

In regard to duty, let me, in conclusion of this hasty letter, inform you that, nearly a hundred years ago, there was a day of remarkable gloom and darkness--still known as "the dark day"--a day when the light of the sun was slowly extinguished as if by eclipse. The Legislature of Connecticut was in session, and, as the members saw the unexpected and unaccountable darkness coming on, they shared in the general awe and terror. It was supposed by many that the last day---the Day of Judgment---had

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treason. ... It is treason to circulate petitions for a compromise or peaceful readjustment of our national troubles ... to question the constitutional powers of the President to increase the standing army without authority of law ... to object to squads of military visiting private houses, and to make search and

seizures ... to question the infallibility of the President, and treason not to concur with him. ... It is treason to talk of hard times, to say that the war might have been avoided. It is treason to be truthful and faithful to the Constitution."

If only our current media had the guts to do the right thing! If only our society were not so politically correct!

We will weather the storm. We are Mississippians!


