
October Meeting WBTS Prisons

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Rebel Ramblings

We had a fine crowd the last meeting and I trust everyone is pleased with the energy and enthusiasm that our new officers are bringing to their positions. Getting programs is a real challenge and anyone who has a good idea for an interesting program should bring it to the attention of our commander Sandy Jackson, or Joe Tubb, who is working on bringing good programs to the camp.

With our own presidential election on the horizon, I thought the camp might like to hear about another presidential election, one that held just as much interest for our Confederate ancestors as the 2012 election has for many of us---the 1864 election.

When 1864 dawned the Confederacy was still resisting the Union invasion and there was no end in sight to the war. True enough large segments of the South were under Federal control, but the two main armies the Confederates had showed no signs of giving up the struggle. Indeed it would take General Grant a summer's campaign and over 60,000 casualties to learn the hard way that the Army of Northern Virginia was as dangerous as ever.

War weariness gripped the North and a significant contingent were beginning to feel the subjugation of the South was not worth the cost. (By the way, a large proportion of the 60,000 men Grant moved into the casualty column were immigrants just off the boat from Europe who enlisted in the Union army to earn the large bonuses paid by the government. When these people were killed or wounded in Virginia the northern public was in large measure indifferent--nobody knew them and nobody cared. If the 1864 casualty lists were composed of the same type of Union soldiers as the 1862 casualty lists, the war would have been over pronto.)

When the Democrats gathered in Chicago in August, 1864, the hard fighting in Virginia, the lack of realization of the extent of Sherman's success in Georgia, and Early's move against Washington had all combined to create a general feeling of gloom in the North. The convention declared that the war had been a failure, nominated General George McClellan for President, and demanded that a peace convention of "all the states" be called to negotiate an end to the war.

Alas for us, the day after the Democrats adjourned, Sherman marched into Atlanta, sending Northern spirits soaring, and dooming McClellan's prospects. Lincoln was re-elected by a majority of over 400,000 votes and he carried all the Northern states ex-



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cept Delaware, New Jersey and Kentucky. The electoral college was even more lopsided, 212 to 21. One surprising fact about the election, when the issue boiled down to a vote for McClellan was a vote for peace, while a vote for Lincoln was a vote for war, the best estimate of the soldier vote was 119,000 for Lincoln and some 34,000 for his opponent. One would think it would have been just the reverse.

Had Joe Johnston done a better job of holding the mountain passes northwest of Atlanta, or had Forrest done a better job of attacking Sherman's supply lines, November 1864 might have found Sherman bogged down in north Georgia, McClellan elected, and our ancestors in possession of what their fathers wrested from England--their own country.

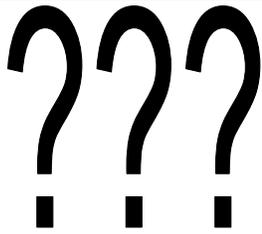

Trivia Question:


This month's question asks:
